- Interpretive displays TRNHA is partnering with Theodore Roosevelt National Park to assist in the updating of educational displays in the visitor centers.
- Junior Ranger Program Support TRNHA provides funds to purchase books, badges, and more.
- 3d Survey Grade Laser Scanner Project We have partnered with Theodore Roosevelt National Park and Knife River Indian Villages to provide a Trimble 3d Laser Scanner. This tool will be invaluable to assist the park with the management and protecting of NPS resources for future generations.
- Preparing College Students for Public Land Careers Theodore Roosevelt National Park and TRNHA will be working together to build an internship program which will be funded by TRNHA.
- Local Family Outreach Program TRNHA will be distributing 100 THRO Annual Park Passes throughout North Dakota. The goal of the program is to bring the local community into the park and to get the word out about all the wonderful opportunities the park offers its visitors.
- Why Painted Canyon Publication One of the most frequently asked questions at Painted Canyon is:
 "Why is it called Painted Canyon?" TRNHA will be working to revive and update a publication from the
 1980s. A donation of \$4000 has been received from Wild Tribute, our apparel vendor, to fund this
 project.


Please join us in welcoming Theodore Roosevelt National Park's newest permanent employees!

Title: Resources Management Specialist

Job Description: Assisting with the management of the Park's variety of resources including bison, elk, feral horses, vegetation, museum curation, historical buildings; the list goes on.

First Impressions of North Dakota: This is actually not my first time working and living in North Dakota. I attended graduate school at North Dakota State University and traveled around the state collecting data on blackbird damage to corn and sunflower. I think my first impression back then was that the landscape was vast and I think that still applies today. This part of the world is vast and breathtaking (and sometimes a little cold).



Previous career/employment experience: My career began with an SCA internship at Lassen Volcanic National Park. Job Description: Working out of the North Unit, my job is talking with park visitors about the incredible resources that we have at TRNP. To contribute to a positive visitor experience, I share information on why the resources are special and worth protecting by providing services that enhance the visitor understanding and appreciation of the park.

First Impressions of North Dakota: It is vast and open, and is a land of subtle and simple beauty.

when I first got my start as a Volunteer-In-Park Intern at Isle Royale. Halfway through that first summer I was hooked and knew that this is the career I wanted. I later returned to Isle Royale 3 summers as a seasonal park ranger. I have also worked at Voyageurs National Park where I presented a variety of "in-character" or first person reenactment programs on the North American Fur Trade. I spent a winter season providing snowshoe and winter ecology programs as an Education Technician at Glacier National Park. Most recently, I worked this last summer up in Alaska at Lake Clark National Park and Preserve. This park is not a traditional National Park Service site that typically has a steady flow of visitors to provide services. Instead, most of my work was focused on relationship building with the communities in and outside of the park that have ties to the land. A lot of my community outreach was completed not in the park, but in local villages only accessible by bush plane. I have also spent some in between winter seasons as an outdoor recreational instructor at Carver County Parks in MN where I provided snowshoe and cross country ski programs, geocaching programs, dog sled events, and maple syrup programs.

Hobbies to keep you occupied during the winter: I like to spend time outside snowshoeing or winter hiking. But if it's a day spent inside I like to read, do jigsaw puzzles, or find crafts to keep me occupied. I also love to cook, and enjoy trying out new recipes since I tend to have more time in the kitchen during the winter months.

Be Sure to Get Your Application in for Summer 2020 National Park Service Jobs!



The National Park Service hires thousands of seasonal employees each year to welcome and educate visitors, conduct research, protect our resources, help keep our parks looking beautiful, and so much more. Seasons vary by park, but summer seasons generally operate between March and September, and winter seasons between October and February.

***a few seasonal positions at Theodore Roosevelt National Park are currently listed on USAJobs and additional seasonal job announcements are scheduled to be added on a rolling basis through March 2020. ***

Tips When Applying to Seasonal Positions

- The park service accepts applications for summer positions between
 October and February and for winter positions between July and August.
- All seasonal vacancies are posted on USAJobs. Search "National Park Service" and select "Temporary" in the Work Type field.
- Some of the larger parks receive hundreds of applications for only a handful
 of openings, so your chances for selection may improve if you apply to a
 smaller park. Consider volunteering or interning with some of our youth
 program partners to gain additional experience.

Remember that your application needs to be submitted prior to the closing date. All announcements will close at 11:59pm EST. If you have questions regarding your application or if you are having technical problems with the system, please try to call or email within 48 hours of the closing date so we can help you. We check our voicemail/email daily and will try to return all calls/emails within 24 hours. Once the announcement has closed we cannot change any information.


Getting active

2020 Interpretive Internships in Theodore Roosevelt National Park

Park interpreters are the public face of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Interns, with support from experienced rangers, are responsible for researching, preparing, and presenting a range of interpretive programs, including guided hikes and interpretive talks on the park's interpretive themes (e.g., wildlife, geology, ecology, and human history). These programs are given in a variety of park locations such as campgrounds, trails, visitor centers, and Roosevelt's cabin. In addition, interns assist in visitor centers providing information and orientation to visitors.



Interns receive 80 hours of formal training including: how to conduct an interpretive programs, customer service, safety, park resources and operations. Additional training and professional development opportunities are also available. If you love learning, sharing what you've learned with others, and working hard in a team environment, these positions prove to be incredibly rewarding. College credits may apply. Supported by Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association.

Required Skills & Interest: Public speaking and presentation skills and abilities; interest and/or knowledge in natural and/or cultural history; computer skills; ability to work independently and live in a remote area; valid driver's license.

Internship Dates: Interns work 40 hours per week with two consecutive days off. Summer internships run from approximately May 10 to August 15, 2020. Beginning and ending date may be flexible. Extensions possible.



Position Location: Two positions are located in the South Unit and one in the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Internships will be based out of Medora or the Watford City area.

Living Expenses & Housing: Interns are reimbursed for living expenses at the rate of \$100 a week. A travel allowance will be provided. The park provides housing, name tags, and uniform shirts. Housing is a furnished apartment or a shared house.

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History of Native American Beadwork

The decoration of hides, pots, bone tools and other objects has been a part of American Indian women's work and leisure time for thousands of years. Many women decorated clothing, blankets, and moccasins with porcupine quills arranged in a design. The design often represented some object (such as bison or a bird) of importance to the woman or her tribe.

The earliest European traders came to North America with glass beads made in European factories to trade for furs. This trade spread across the continent throughout the 18th and 19th centuries. Many beadworkers of the Great Plains tribes substituted colorful beads for porcupine quills in their decorative work. When American Indians signed treaties and established their lists of annuity goods that they were to receive in exchange for their land, beads were often listed as desirable annuity goods. Reservation traders kept supplies of beads in various sizes, styles, and colors that could be sold or traded to their Indian customers.

Once reservations were established, women produced more beadwork in more elaborate designs than ever before. They may have had more time for beadwork, since the tribes spent less time hunting, drying meat, and moving camp to find food sources. During the early reservation years, women also found that their beaded objects had value to non-Indian visitors to the reservations. Frontier army officers and their wives recognized the beauty of beaded leather objects. Linda Slaughter of Bismarck knew how important beadwork was for



American Indian women. She wrote that "bead work and dressing and embroidering deerskins to be made into garments were the industries of the women . . . and much of their work had artistic merit."

Education of Indian children in day schools and boarding schools usually included developing craft skills. Boys learned welding, carpentry, and blacksmithing. Girls learned to sew, embroider, and knit. Some schools hired

American Indian women to teach beading to the students. Students decorated belts, moccasins, and purses. Schools on the Fort Berthold reservation sent beaded pieces to exhibitions in eastern cities such as Boston. Girls learned to adapt traditional designs to European American interests.

Why is this important?

Beadwork was an important economic skill that American Indian women learned from older women and passed on to their daughters and other young women. Before the reservation era, a skilled beadworker could sell her work to others in her village in exchange for meat or horses. During the reservation era, beading took on new significance as a source of cash income. Cash was necessary to purchase food, clothing, tools, and household objects. The cash income earned by beadworkers replaced traditional forms of economic activity such as hunting and gardening.

Today, both men and women apply beads to objects that are both artistic and practical.

Beadwork is still an important skill.

Skilled beadworkers sell decorated objects to visitors and offer beautifully decorated pieces as gifts. Beading is a tradition that has been adapted as circumstances changed for American Indians.

Even though styles, tools, and even the beads have changed, beading is a way that modern American Indians connect with the traditions of their past.

Almost every reservation had a trader's store. Traders also recognized the beauty of beaded designs. Traders knew that people living in fine homes in Chicago, New York, and other cities would pay well for these pieces. The traders often asked the beadworkers to change their designs a little to please the collectors.

The products of skilled beadworkers became even more important as more Americans chose to spend their vacations traveling in the United States. Automobiles took tourists to reservations and nearby cities where tourists became customers for American Indian women's beadwork. Tourists purchased moccasins, toy-sized tipis, and dolls. They sometimes bought more elaborate pieces such as beaded shirts.

She began beading at a the young age of 6 and has carried the passion throughout her life. She loves the beautiful bead colors and designing patterns. Over the years she has developed her own unique patterns which she hand draws out in a notebook before be-



ginning the projects. Her steady hand and years of experience bring us many beautiful beaded items.



What's that Bird?

Photos and information shared by Birding Expert & TRNHA Board Member Jesse Kolar



Red-breasted Nuthatch, one of the tamest birds in the park, and often with black-capped chickadees.



Brewer's Blackbird, pretty easy to find in prairie dog towns. Look for a light-eyed blackbird with a really shiny look to it. They're very similar to a grackle, but I think they act more like a cowbird with their tails and head often pointing straight in the air.



Black-capped chickadee. Because these are one of the few birds that remain in winter and sing all year long, most North Dakotans recognize their song, whether they know what it is or not. Example song: https://www.allaboutbirds.org/.../Black-capped.../sounds



American Goldfinch (AKA in North Dakota as a canary, albeit mistakenly). Only the males look this bright, and only for a few months out of the year, so most people do not recognize that they show up at their feeders in the winter.



Black-headed Grosbeak.
Although we used to find these consistently on the Bird Walk, they're not as common as they once were in Cottonwood Campground. They're still regularly found in the badlands, and this photo was taken near the Chateau de Mores.

Yellow-breasted Chat, hard to see, but heard in most of the park where there are deciduous trees all summer long, and all day and night long. One of the handful of birds in the state that like to mimic other bird sounds.




Tidbit #2:



MEDORA, North Dakota- Following guidance from the White House, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and state and local public health authorities, Theodore Roosevelt National Park is increasing recreational access and services. The National Park Service (NPS) is working servicewide with federal, state, and local public health authorities to closely monitor the COVID-19 pandemic and using a phased approach to increase access on a park-by-park basis.

Beginning July 1, Theodore Roosevelt National Park will reopen the South Unit Visitor Center in Medora for information services and bookstore sales. The North Unit, South Unit, and Elkhorn Ranch Units are all open for recreational access.

Additionally, the following facilities and spaces are open and accessible:

- All trails and trailheads
- All picnic areas
- All toilet facilities
- Backcountry camping (permit available on park website)
- All North and South Unit roads with the exception of road failure section (see park website)

With public health in mind, the following facilities remain closed at this time:

- North Unit Juniper Campground and group sites
- North Unit Contact Station
- Painted Canyon Visitor Center
- South Unit Cottonwood Campground and group sites
- Roundup Horse Camp group site

The health and safety of our visitors, employees, volunteers, and partners continues to be paramount. At Theodore Roosevelt National Park, our operational approach will be to regularly examine and monitor each facility function and service provided to ensure those operations comply with current public health guidance. We continue to work closely with the NPS Office of Public Health using CDC guidance to ensure public and workspaces are safe and clean for visitors, employees, partners, and volunteers.



National Parks Provide Free Entrance to Celebrate Passage of the Great American Out-

WASHINGTON – In celebration of President Trump signing the Great American Outdoors Act, Secretary of the Interior David L. Bernhardt announced free entrance to national parks and public lands for August 5, 2020, and he designated August 4th as the "Great American Outdoors Day." In future years, every August 4 will be a free entrance day to celebrate the signing of this landmark legislation, joining the other scheduled entrance fee-free days which commemorate or celebrate significant dates. The Great American Outdoors Act will enable national parks and other federal lands to repair and upgrade vital infrastructure and facilities that will enrich the visitor experience, protect resources, and enable increased access for all visitors.

"President Trump has just enacted the most consequential dedicated funding for national parks, wildlife refuges, public recreation facilities and American Indian school infrastructure in U.S. history," said Secretary Bernhardt. "I've designated August 4th as Great American Outdoors Day and waived entrance fees to celebrate the passage of this historic conservation law."

"This is a truly historic commitment to revitalize and restore national parks and other public lands in order to expand recreational opportunities and address long overdue infrastructure and modernization challenges," said National Park Service Deputy Director David Vela, exercising the authority of the Director. "This enormous investment will enhance national parks for present and future generations."

The Great American Outdoors Act combines two major conservation initiatives into one legislative package. It establishes the National Parks and Public Lands Legacy Restoration Fund (Restoration Fund) and guarantees permanent full funding for the existing Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). Funding of this magnitude will reduce the maintenance backlog, protect critical resources, increase recreational offerings, and focus on long-term sustainable operations for the next century.

The investment will pay dividends. Public lands are an important contributor to a strong and growing outdoor recreation economy that benefits states and local communities. National parks have been experiencing record-breaking attendance in recent years, including hosting 328 million visitors in 2019. National park visitor spending supports nearly 330,000 jobs and contributes more than \$40 billion annually to the national economy, including more than \$20 billion in communities surrounding parks.

There are 109 national parks that charge entrance fees ranging from \$5 to \$35. The other 310 national parks do not have entrance fees. The entrance fee waiver for the fee-free days does not cover amenity or user fees for activities such as

camping, boat launches, transportation or special tours.

Where it is currently possible to adhere to public health guidance, outdoor spaces in national parks are open to the public, as well as some facilities. Please check with individual parks for specific details about park operations. The National Park Service continues to urge visitors to #RecreateResponsibly. Follow guidance provided by the Center for







Deegan earned an undergraduate degree in Parks and Recreation from the University of North Dakota. She is a 2011 graduate of the Facility Manager Leaders Program. She also holds a certificate in Cultural Heritage Tourism from George Washington University.



Newly Paved Accessible Trails are Open!

The mission of the National Park Service has always been to "preserve unimpaired the natural and cultural resources and values of the National Park System for the enjoyment, education, and inspiration of this and future generations." At Theodore Roosevelt National Park, park staff is striving to preserve this mission while making sure that it remains accessible to those who visit.

Accessible means something different to each and every person, and unfortunately not every inch of the park is accessible to ever park visitor. However, park staff has been working hard to provide everyone the opportunity to get out of their vehicle and take a hike. If you visited the park in August or September you may have noticed some trail closures or concrete trucks entering the South Unit. These trucks were headed to the closed trails at Skyline Vista and Boicourt Overlook, which have now been rebuilt and made accessible to park visitors. Trails are now open and ready for you to explore and soon new Interpretive Signs will be placed along them as a way for you to learn more about the park.



Did you know National Parks also offer an Access Pass? The Access Pass is a free lifetime entrance pass to all federal areas charging an entrance fee. It also provides a 50% reduction of expanded amenity fees for activities such as camping. Passes are available to all U.S. citizens or permanent residents with disabilities. Passes can be obtained in person wherever interagency passes are sold (park entrance stations when open, or in visitor centers during seasonal entrance station closures.)

TRNHA Aid Funds at Work

Bat Week and More!

Halloween is just around the corner and it brings thoughts of pumpkins, and ghost, witches, spiders and bats. Some of you may cringe at the thought of these crazy critters, but others get excited to explore them further. Well in this newsletter we are going to take a look at a one of those critters that can be found in our National Parks.

If you have ever visited Theodore Roosevelt's Maltese Cross Cabin in the summer, you may have noticed signs stating beware of Bats. These flying little guys find the eve of the old cabin an awesome place to spend their days while waiting for their evening



adventures. Since they choose to stay near the cabin and it is almost Halloween we thought we would share a little bit about these "cute" or "creepy" little guys.



Bat Week is Oct. 24 - Oct. 31! This is an excellent opportunity to celebrate bats. Bats do a lot of things that help our natural areas be strong and healthy:

- Some bats eat insects that destroy crops and spread disease.
- Some bats pollinate plants, like agave.
- Bats help spread seeds to grow new plants.

Help Bats

We need bats if we want <u>healthy and diverse ecosystems</u> filled with a variety of organisms. Many bats feast on insects, some pollinate plants, and some bats spread seeds, too. Larger animals may depend on bats for prey. Aside from all these great services, bats are the only mammal that's capable of true flight, and they're simply fascinating.

The deadly fungal disease, <u>white-nose syndrome</u> (WNS), poses a real danger to cave-dwelling bats. Tree-roosting and migratory bats face significant threats from wind turbines. WNS has killed 99% of some bat colonies, and habitat loss and wind turbines also make it difficult for bats to survive and thrive.

But we can all help protect bats and their habitats! Try some of these ideas to help conserve bats. You can help bats in your own yard and community, and you can learn how to protect bats when you visit parks, too.

At Home

- Learn more about bats. One of the most important things you can do to help bats is to learn more about them and share what you learn with your friends and family. Check out these <u>fun Bativities</u> for some ideas. <u>Bat Conservation International</u> and <u>BatWeek.org</u> both provide a lot of information about bats and ways you can help.
- Use iNaturalist. With an app on your smartphone, you can take part in citizen science by observing bats in a park or in your own backyard. Learn more <u>about iNaturalist</u> and add your own observations.
- Build a bat house. Bats are running out of good places to roost, rest, and raise young. A backyard bat house will provide shelter they desperately need in your neighborhood or community. In national parks, staff work to protect natural habitat for bats to live in instead of building bat houses.

In Parks

- Stay out of caves when directed. The bats at risk for WNS often hibernate or raise young in caves. They need to be undisturbed so they can rest and raise their young. Also, it is actually unlawful to enter most caves on public lands.
- Decontaminate before going in a cave. It may be possible for humans to spread WNS from one cave into another. Be sure to listen to rangers' directions for cleaning (or leaving behind) your shoes, backpack, and gear before entering a cave.
- Tell a ranger if you see bats acting strangely. Rangers can take steps to protect both bats and people if a bat is behaving in an unusual way.

And no matter where you are, you can celebrate Bat Week in October every year!



Free Entrance for 5th Grade Students

DES MOINES, Iowa — While at Neil Smith National Wildlife Refuge, U.S. Secretary of the Interior David L. Bernhardt signed a Secretary's Order that waives entrance

fees to national parks, wildlife refuges and other public lands and waters managed by the Department of the Interior for 5th grade students and their families from now until Aug. 31, 2021.

Secretary Bernhardt's actions ensure that American 5th grade students who may have been unable to make full use of the Every Kid Outdoors Annual 4th Grade Pass during the



2019-2020 academic year due to the COVID-19 pandemic will have free access to national parks and other Federal lands managed by the Department during this academic year.

"The Trump Administration has made expanding public access to America's national parks and public lands a top priority, especially during this year's pandemic," said Secretary Bernhardt. "Programming was limited at times for last year's fourth graders through the Every Kid Outdoors program, so we're allowing this year's 5th graders free access to our public lands throughout the 2020-2021 academic year. We hope these kids and their families take advantage of the incredible physical and mental benefits of getting outside and visiting a park, refuge or campground near them."

"As the mother of a fifth grader I am particularly excited for families across the country to have more opportunities to explore, play and learn in America's parks and public lands," said Margaret Everson, Counselor to the Secretary, exercising the delegated authority of the National Park Service Director. "We know many 4th graders were disappointed they were unable to use the pass last year and we are grateful to Secretary Bernhardt for giving them this opportunity"

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A majority of Interior-managed lands remained accessible to the public at the onset of the pandemic to serve as places of respite and rejuvenation and allow for social distancing. Services were limited for visitors, in particular impacting the Every Kid Outdoors Program. Nearly all units and locations are currently accessible with many having restored services for the public to enjoy following proper public health and safety guidelines.

Free Entrance for 5th Grade Students

Background Information on the Every Kid Outdoors Program

Through the Every Kid Outdoors Program for fourth grade students, entrance fees for the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and standard amenity recreation fees for the Bureau of Land Management and the Bureau of Reclamation are waived, providing limitless opportunities to explore, learn, and recreate in spectacular settings. The pass does not cover expanded amenity fees such as camping or boat rides.

The program focuses on children around 10 years of age based on research that indicates children ages 9–11 are at a unique



developmental stage in their learning where they begin to understand how the world around them works in more concrete ways, and they are more receptive to engaging with nature and the environment. By focusing on this age group year after year, the program aims to ensure every child in the United States has the opportunity to visit their Federal lands and waters by the age of 11 years, hopefully establishing lifelong bonds to our country's natural and cultural heritage.

Like many of you, throughout 2020 we found ourselves wondering how we would survive and what the future looked like for our organization and park partners.

While we faced several challenges in 2020, one thing never waivered and that was the support we received from all of you. We spent half of our summer season without a store location to operate and the other half trying to keep up with all of the purchases you were making. It was truly amazing to see how much love you all have for the parks we serve. When we were finally allowed to open our doors, you surprised us purchasing merchandise at a rate higher than then ever before and helping us make up for some of our loss.

Despite the challenges we faced in 2020, we are excited to report that we provided \$147,177 of support to our parks. Aid funds were used to purchase a new interpretive display that will be installed this winter in the South Unit Visitor Center, laser scanning equipment which is used to survey and document areas throughout the park assisting with current and future projects, and visitor center staffing. As we move into 2021, we have had to cut budgets but are excited to have some funds to once again give back to our partners. Keep your eyes open for details of that support in future newsletters.

To say it was an interesting year would be an understatement, but we are proud of what we were able to accomplish and are excited to be moving into a new year! We bid farewell to a year that was challenging but taught us a lot about what it takes to succeed. As we move into 2021, we are cautiously optimistic of what the future will hold for TRNHA and our partners.

















Free Entrance Days for National Parks 2021

WASHINGTON – The Trump Administration today announced that all National Park Service sites will have six <u>entrance feefree days</u> in 2021. The fee-free days are part of the Administration's unprecedented commitment to increase access, promote recreational opportunities, improve visitor facilities and conserve natural and historical treasures in national parks for the benefit and enjoyment of the American people.

The dates for 2021 are:

- Monday, January 18 Martin Luther King, Jr. Day
- Saturday, April 17 First Day of <u>National Park Week</u>
- Wednesday, August 4 One year anniversary of the Great American Outdoors Act
- Wednesday, August 25 <u>National Park Service Birthday</u>
- Saturday, September 25 <u>National Public Lands Day</u>
- Thursday, November 11 <u>Veterans Day</u>

"Each of the fee-free days celebrates or commemorates a significant event, including the establishment earlier this year by President Trump of the Great American Outdoors Act. The legislation marks the single largest investment ever in national parks and will result in enhanced facilities and expanded recreational prospects for all visitors," **said Margaret Everson, Counselor to the Secretary, exercising the delegated authority of the National Park Service Director.** "Throughout the country, every national park provides a variety of opportunities to get out in nature, connect with our common heritage and experience the vast array of benefits that come from spending time outdoors. Hopefully the fee-free days will encourage everyone to spend some time in their national parks."

There are more than 400 National Park Service sites nationwide, with at least one in every state. Approximately 100 charge an entrance fee, with costs ranging from \$5 to \$35. The other 300-plus national parks do not have entrance fees.

Earlier this year, Secretary of the Interior David L. Bernhardt signed Secretary's Orders 3386 and 3387, granting veterans, Gold Star Families and fifth graders free access to all national parks, wildlife refuges and other Federal lands managed by the Department of the Interior. Veterans and Gold Star Families will have free access forever, while fifth grade students were granted the reprieve through this academic year as some of last year's fourth graders may have been unable to make full use of the Every Kid Outdoors Annual Fourth Grade Pass due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Active duty military and fourth grade students will continue to have free access with discounted passes also available for senior citizens. For other visitors who love visiting our public lands, the annual \$80 America the Beautiful National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Pass is a great option, which allows unlimited entrance to more than 2,000 federal recreation areas, including all national parks.

Last year, 327 million people visited national parks and spent \$21 billion in local communities. This supported 340,500 jobs across the country and had a \$41.7 billion impact on the U.S. economy.

Other federal land management agencies offering their own fee-free days in 2021 include the <u>U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service</u>, <u>Bureau of Land Management</u>, <u>Bureau of Reclamation</u>, <u>U.S. Forest Service</u> and <u>U.S. Army Corps of Engineers</u>.
