Moccasin Making Workshop

On Saturday, January 18th, join Park Ranger Darian Kath for a moccasin making workshop at Knife River Indian Villages NHS. This program will provide an overview of footwear styles with a focus on simple side-seam moccasins. Instruction will then be provided in making a foot pattern and constructing the moccasins.

Audubon Christmas Bird Count

It was Christmas Day of 1900, Frank Chapman, American ornithologist and member of the American Museum of Natural History, initiated a new holiday tradition—the Christmas Bird Census. The census was intended to replace a hunting tradition with a more conservation oriented activity. Over time, this became the annual "Audubon Christmas Bird Count." Every year, between December 15 and January 5, people at parks and other organizations nation-wide head out to count and identify the wild bird species around them and report their findings to the Audubon Society. Recently, park and association staff conducted and reported the Christmas Bird Count. Here are the highlights of our Christmas Bird Count report,

In the North Unit of TRNP, a total of 16 species were identified. Of these species, the most abundant was the Ring-necked Pheasant; the number of pheasants seen was over 230.

In the South Unit of TRNP, a total of 28 species were seen. Of these species, the most abundant was the American Robin; the number of robins seen was over 260.

Knowing what bird populations are healthy and where they are wintering helps us all understand how birds are thriving and where they are facing threats. The Christmas Bird Count provides information about bird populations across the U.S. going back over 100 years.

Prairie Dog Fast Facts

- There are 5 species of prairie dog in the United States
- Black-tailed prairie dogs live in Theodore Roosevelt National Park
- Prairie dogs live in social groups called coteries
- Members of a close group acknowledge each other with an identifying kiss or sniff
- A community with close burrows is called a "town"
- A prairie dog burrow may lead to a network of tunnels with several entrances
- They feed on forbs and grasses



Can You Guess In 7 Hints?

A theme and seven questions are found below. Each question relates to a single answer associated with Theodore Roosevelt National Park, Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site, or the life of Theodore Roosevelt. How many questions will you need to determine

the answer? Let's find out!

Last Month's Answer: The River of Doubt

Formerly called the Rio da Dúvida (River of Doubt), today, the tributary to the Aripuanã River, running a length of 760 km (470 mi), is named Rio Teodoro (Roosevelt River) after Theodore Roosevelt. It was mapped during the Roosevelt-Rondon Expedition in 1914-1915, after Theodore's failed bid for a third term Presidency. Theodore Roosevelt recounts the trip in the book he authored: Into the Brazilian Wilderness (www.nps.gov/thrb).

Theme: Paleontology

TRNHA: A Legacy of Support

Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association (TRNHA) was founded in 1951 by a group of park enthusiasts committed to supporting and promoting the historical, scientific, and educational activities of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Over the years, TRNHA's dedication has expanded to include supporting the Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site.

TRNHA's Mission and Achievements

Today, TRNHA operates four park stores located in Theodore Roosevelt National Park and Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site. The association's mission is to provide support, services, and educational merchandise to enhance visitor experiences and enjoyment through historical, scientific, and educational activities. Since its inception, TRNHA has contributed over \$1.9 million in aid to their park partners, underscoring their significant impact.

Investing in Education and Outreach through Partnerships

Each month, our newsletter will highlight the various ways the association works to achieve its mission. This month, the focus is on our remarkable partnerships. Collaborations with park partners and generous donors play a crucial role in helping TRNHA achieve its goals.

Collaborative Efforts and Contributions

TRNHA values partnerships and is fortunate to have outstanding park partners dedicated to protecting public lands. Additionally, external partners, like Wild Tribute, support their mission by contributing 4% of their proceeds to support America's historic and wild places. These partnerships help TRNHA extend its reach and impact.





Upcoming Initiatives: Fiscal Year 2025

In fiscal year 2025, TRNHA plans to invest approximately \$20,000 to hire Ranger Sydney as a Seasonal Media and Education Ranger. This new position will work alongside District Rangers in the south unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park to redesign the park's newspaper, informational brochures, and webpage. The goal is to improve the availability of information for visitors planning their park experiences. Ranger Sydney's role will also enable the implementation of more spring programs, social media updates, and community outreach.

TRNHA's continued efforts in promoting Theodore Roosevelt National Park demonstrate their commitment to enriching visitor experiences and preserving the legacy of America's natural and historical treasures.

President's Day

Excerpts from "President's Day: The Truth Behind the Holiday" from MountVernon.org

Today the nation typically combines Washington's Birthday with Presidents' Day, celebrating both days on the third Monday in February. However, Presidents' Day is not the official name of the holiday. While the name "Presidents' Day" was proposed for this Monday holiday in 1951, the U.S. government never officially changed the name. In the 1980s, thanks to advertising campaigns for holiday sales, the term became popularized and largely accepted.



The idea behind the name was to create a holiday that did not recognize a specific president, but rather celebrated the office of the presidency. This joint recognition would also celebrate President Lincoln's February 12 birthday within the same period...

The bald eagle has been an iconic symbol of the United States for over 200 years, but recently the bald eagle received official recognition for its stately status. On December 23, 2024 President Joe Biden signed into law a legislation sent by Congress to designate the bald eagle as the national bird of the United States.

With regional populations growing, bald eagles can be a fairly common site at Theodore Roosevelt National Park and Knife River Indian Villages NHS.






Can You Guess In 7 Hints?
